Show and Tell – Tonight’s theme was US and world Currency.

Nick S. - presented a Russian 1917 Rouble note, interestingly printed in China, and it was printed to pay workers for the Trans-Siberian railroad.

Bob S. - started collecting US currency about 2.5 years ago. He presented a book that he deemed “The Bible” of US currency, specifically National Bank Notes and the different Charters. He showed a note from the National Bank of Sacramento.

Bill W, aka \$2 bill. - presented a \$1 note he acquired from A & D coin in Sacramento, with serial number 11111118 and it had many, many folds.

Pat C. - presented a colorful \$50 note from Canada with “spirograph like” markings as a security feature on the note. This note depicts the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (Mounties) on the reverse.

Bryan S. - shared an uncut sheet of \$2 bills, series 1995! Of note, modern sheets of notes are not sequential serial numbers as well as they all start with serial number 999 to differentiate between those on sheets and those issued as cut notes. At times people will “miscut” notes from sheets and present them as “error” notes, so if you’re looking for those errors, be sure their serial numbers do not start with 999.

Damon W. - shared a \$1 from 1985 with a “B” on it, from the Reagan administration era. Certain Christmas cards included notes that were counter signed by the Treasurer and Secretary of the Treasury.

Stewart E. - When he was in high school in Ethiopia, and after performing in the palace, he personally received a gold sovereign from Haile Selassie.

Ken R. - shared 5 bank notes he acquired, all from across the US mostly during the Civil War, all from the American Banknote Company, plus a Hawaiian Note.

Marty H. - acquired a 10 Peso note from The Philippines, depicting George Washington. The Philippines was a US territory from 1896 until post WWII.

Tim T. - shared a \$100,000 note replica in 22K gold, authorized by The Smithsonian. The \$100,000 note was only used for inter-bank transfers, and never for public use.

Jarod H. - shared a birthday note, meaning the serial number denotes a special birthday. In this case it was a star and the serial number was 10262002, so October 26, 2002, which is his son’s birthday.

Flavio H - shared a 1 Peso note from Mexico from 1914, depicting an older styled eagle. He is still searching for a 1985 50,000 Peso note, now defunct, but when his dad gave it to him, it was worth about \$200.

The show and tell prize was a PF67, 1957 Franklin half dollar, won by Jarod.

Auction - The auction began at 7:54 p.m. with John Degan presiding as auctioneer. Assisting as runners for auction items were Christine S., Bob S., Marty H., and John B.
